


As of December 31, 2022, our Facebook page had 44,818 followers, our Instagram page had 27,372 followers, and we started a TikTok presence in September 2022!

INTAKE


In 2022 we rescued 145 dogs and 75 cats from 28 Manitoba locations: as far North as Churchill and as far South as Sprague.

We also rescued animals from outside of Manitoba, in Keewatin, ON and Sanikiluaq, NU.

Our busiest intake month was June, bringing 26 new animals into care. Our slowest month for intake was November, bringing in 5 new animals.

FOSTERING



Fostering is a HUGE part of our rescue, without fosters we would have nowhere for the Mutts and honorary Mutts (cats) we save to go. We are ever so grateful to our fosters who open their homes and hearts to a Mutt in need.

We did see the number of foster applications again decrease since the height of COVID in 2020. In 2020, we saw the highest number of foster applications ever (494). In comparison to 2021 which was 204 and in 2022, we received 114 applications. Unfortunately, the number of foster applications that we are receiving are continuing to trend down alarmingly.

Out of the 114 foster applications from 2022, 31 made it through the full application process and were officially signed on. This was compared to 75 homes that signed on in 2021. There are many reasons why applicants don't make it through the process - they don't return the required volunteer

forms, their current animals roam free, they end up fostering for another rescue (many apply for multiple rescues at the same time), life got complicated, or they decided to adopt instead.

Out of the 31 homes that signed up in 2022, 10 never ended up taking on a foster, 5 fostered 1 or 2 times before they ended up "failing" after which they stopped fostering, 9 fostered 1-2 times in 2022 and have stopped, and 7 of the 31 fosters are still fostering in 2023. Thank you to those who are still fostering!!




ADOPTIONS

We were fortunate enough to adopt out 158 dogs and 79 cats into wonderful homes during the 2022 year. It is very rewarding to see an animal go from abandoned and unwanted, to loved and cherished, in their forever home.

Occasionally, there are adoption placements that don't work out, so the animals come back into our care. We had 22 dogs and 4 cats returned to foster care in 2022 that had been adopted for 1 day to 9 and a half years.



Reasons included: allergies (1), animal seized (1), behaviour issues (4), divorce/separation (2), illness/death in the family (4), no time (2), resident animals not adjusting (7), unprepared to deal with a new pet (5).



One of the questions on our adoption application is, "Where did you hear about Manitoba Mutts Dog Rescue?". The results of those answers show that word of mouth is our most common adoption source with social media as a close second.

This means our team is doing a great job of making a memorable positive impact on adopters, followers, and supporters!

Get Fixed!

In 2022, Manitoba Mutts can claim responsibility for spaying 106 dogs and 40 cats and neutering 77 dogs and 41 cats.

In just one year, this has prevented an estimated 1,700 additional puppies and kittens and has saved countless lives in the process!



SUPER TROOPERS

There are extreme cases of care and support for ailments such as amputations, parvo virus, mange, heartworm disease, etc. These animals are selected to be featured as our Super Troopers (ST's). Their will to live and our generous community of volunteers and donors save their lives. Along the way these dogs touch the lives of those involved. In 2022 we had 18 Super Trooper cases as compared to last year, in which we had 35 cases.

Barktender Raffle

Since liquor and wine seem to be a very successful draw, we kept them again as the prizes for the 2022 raffle. We sold 4,875 of the possible 5,000 tickets. The total amount brought in from ticket sales was \$9,750, minus the cost of the tickets and some bottles that we had to purchase to fill the prize quotas, our total profit was \$8,332.54.





Merch

We added a few new items to our merchandise line in 2022, such as stemless wine tumblers, ladies style hoodies, tumbler with straw, new mugs, packable jackets, pens & chapstick, jumbo grocery totes, and new travel mugs. The total amount raised from merch was \$5,596.00.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Board of Directors Manitoba Mutts Dog Rescue Inc.

Report on the Audit of the Financial Statements

Qualified Opinion

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Manitoba Mutts Dog Rescue Inc., which comprise the statement of financial position as at December 31, 2022 and the statements of operations, changes in net assets and cash flows for the year then ended and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

In our opinion, except for the possible effetcs of the matter described in the Basis for Qualifed Opinion section of our report, the financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Manitoba Mutts Dog Rescue Inc. as at December 31, 2022 and its financial performance and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.

Basis for Qualified Opinion

In common with many not-for-profit organization, the entity derives revenues from fundraising activities, the completeness of which is not susceptible to satisfactory audit verification. Accordingly, verification of these revenues was limited to the amounts recorded in the records of the entity. Therefore, we were not able to determine whether any adjustments might be necessary to fundraising revenues, excess of revenues over expenses, cash flows from operations, assets and net assets for the year ended December 31, 2022. Our audit opinion on the financial statements for the year ended December 31, 2022 was modified accordingly becasue of the possible effects of this limitation in scope.

We conducted our audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are independent of the Entity in accordance with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements in Canada, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our qualified opinion.

Responsibilities of Management and Those Charged with Governance for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with ASNPO, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the organization's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the organization or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so. Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the organization's financial reporting process.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance

Notes to the Financial Statements For the Year Ended December 31, 2022

1. PURPOSE OF THE ORGANIZATION

The Manitoba Mutts Dog Rescue Inc. is a volunteer run, non-profit organization based in Winnipeg, Manitoba. The Organization became a registered charity under the Income Tax Act on October 18, 2015. The Organization provides care, maintenance and rehabilitation of stray, abandoned and displaced animals in Manitoba.

2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparation

The financial statements of the Organization have been prepared in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.

b. Cash and short term investments

Cash and cash equivalents consist primarily of commercial paper and deposits with an original maturity date of purchase of three months or less. Because of the short-term maturity of these investments, their carrying amount approximates fair value.

c. Inventories

Inventory is valued at the lower of cost and net realizable value with the cost being determined on a first-in, first-out basis.

d. Tangible capital assets

Tangible capital assets are stated at cost less accumulated amortization. Amortization is provided using the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives as follows:

Equipment 20%

The Organization regularly reviews its tangible capital assets to eliminate obsolete items.

The amortization of the tangible capital assets is calculated half of the above mentioned rates for the year of purchase and no amortization is recorded in the year of disposal.

2. Significant Accounting Policies

e. Revenue recognition

The Organization uses the deferral method of accounting for contributions under which restricted contributions related to expenses of future periods are deferred and recognized as revenue in the period in which the related expenses are incurred.

Restricted contributions for the purchase of tangible capital asset that will be amortized have been deferred and will be recognized as revenue on the same basis as the amortization expense related to the acquired tangible assets.

The Organization recognizes government funding, grants and donations in the period in which it is received unless it is otherwise stated by the funder.

Adoption income is recognized when there is persuasive evidence that an arrangement exist and collection is reasonably assured.

The Organization recognizes fundraising in the period in which the activity occurs.

f. Use of estimates

When preparing financial statements according to Canadian accounting standards for not-forprofit organizations (ASNPO), we make estimates and assumptions relating to:

- Reported amounts of revenue and expenses
- Reported amounts of assets and liabilities
- Disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities

Management's assumptions on a number of factors including historical experience, current events, actions that the company may undertake in the future, and other assumptions that we believe are reasonable under the circumstances. Actual results could differ from those estimates under different conditions and assumptions.

g. Financial instruments

The Organization initially measures its financial assets and financial liablities at fair value. It subsequently measures all its financial assets and fiancial liabilities at amortized cost.

Financial assets subsequently measured at amortized cost include cash and accounts receivable. Financial liablities measured at amortized cost include accounts payable, accrued liabilities and spay and neuter liability.

4. LINE OF CREDIT

The Organization has an operating line of credit from Casera Credit Union with an available amount totalling \$5,000 bearing interest at a rate of 18%. The line of credit is secured by a general security agreement. As at December 31, 2022 the line of credit is not used.
